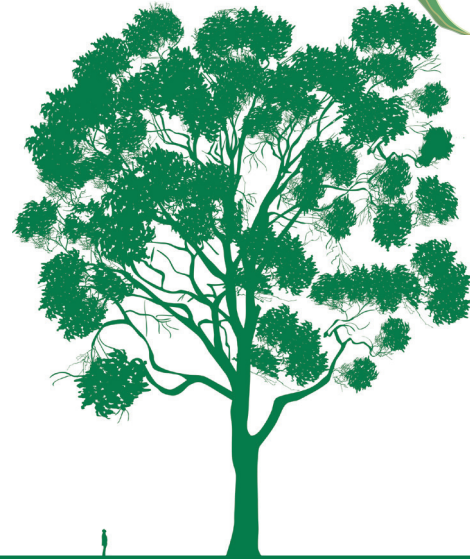











# Narrow-leaved Ironbark

With its furrowed black bark, slender branches and drooping rounded crown, the Narrow-leaved Ironbark is a unique addition to the Australian landscape. This striking tree has grey-green lance-shaped leaves which contrast beautifully with the dark bark. From Spring to Summer, small white flowers add to the display. The flowers also attract birds and native bees. Naturally found from Sydney to Cape York, this tree grows best in well-drained soils and will tolerate periods of drought and frost.

 <b>Leaf</b>	Dull green and pointed, oval-like shape
 <b>Bark</b>	Furrowed
 <b>Flowers</b>	White and fluffy
 <b>Fruit Pod</b>	Cup-shaped capsule
