










Thin-leaved Stringybark

Commonly known as the Thin-leaved Stringy Bark, this species is native to eastern Australia. As its name suggests, it has rough, stringy bark and long lance-shaped leaves along with small clusters of white flowers. Being relatively long-lived, living more than 100 years, this species is hardy. It is sometimes referred to as 'Good Kind Stringybark' by beekeepers due to the healthy and productive native bees that call this species home.
